



Year 5/6 Curriculum Information

Spring 2





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English

Our English this half term is based on 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Q Rauf.

- To write a narrative recount;
- To write a persuasive speech using persuasive devices and introductory and concluding statements.

In Reading we will look at:

- Retrieval;
- Skimming and Scanning
- Authorial intent and Character Viewpoints; Year 6 will also be preparing for their SATs reading paper.

Don't forget! World Book Day Thursday 7th March 2024. The children are invited to dress up should they wish.

Please record any reading done at home on the reading bookmark and don't forget that all children have access to the online SORA E-Library via their Google Classroom account.

Year 5 and 6 will cover different units in maths this half term.

Year 5:

- Multiplication up to 4 digits by 2 digits;
- Short division with remainders;
- Common factors and multiples and prime numbers;
- Decimals ordering and comparing;
- Statistics understanding tables.

Year 6:

- Factors, multiples and primes;
- Equivalences and imperial measures;
- Algebra;
- Revisit style lessons in preparation for SATs.

We will be continuing to build on children's speed and fluency of times tables recall through mental maths challenges. All children have a login to Times Tables RockStars to practise their times tables at home.

Science

This half term we will be learning about Earth and Space:

- Stars, planets and moons have so much mass they attract other things, including each other, due to a force called gravity. Gravity works over a distance;
- Objects with larger masses exert bigger gravitational forces;
- Objects like planets, moons and stars spin.
- Smaller mass objects like planets orbit larger mass objects like stars;
- Stars produce a vast amount of heat and light. All other objects are lumps of rock, metal or ice and can be seen because they reflect the light of stars.

Theme

Through our theme of 'Migration and Movement', we will be exploring:

- What import and export means;
- Trade and economic links and how these impact us and those around us;
- How trade and economics has developed over time:
- How and why people migrate, including push and pull factors;
- How climate affects import and exports and about Fairtrade and its benefits.

A plea...

This half term, we will be looking at 'FairTrade' and Import and Export.

We would love to collect food packaging from around the world to investigate where these have come from and why. If you have any interesting food packaging (no specific nut products please) please could you send these in to school with your child.


Migration and Movement

Did you know...

 By the end of 2019, there were nearly 26 million refugees in the world — a record number.

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- Half of the world's refugees are children.
- In Syria alone, more than <u>6.6 million people have</u> <u>fled</u>, seeking safety in Lebanon, Turkey, Jordan and beyond.
- In Lebanon, where more than 1 million Syrian refugees reside, approximately 70% of Syrian refugees live below the poverty line.
- Over the past three years, more than 75,000 children have been born in the refugee camps of Cox's Bazar.
- About 30% of refugees arriving through the Balkans are children, while roughly 25% of these children are unaccompanied.
- At least 3.7 million refugee children are out of school, a figure likely worsened by the COVID pandemic.



<u>Fairtrade</u>

The idea of fair trade has been around since the 1960s, but fair-trade labels were not used until 1988. In 1992 several charitable organizations, including Oxfam, Christian Aid, and Traidcraft, came together to create the Fairtrade Foundation in the United Kingdom. Fair Trade USA launched its FairTrade Certified label in 1998. These foundations, and others around the world, help farmers and producers sell their goods.
