Wangari Muta Maathai

Wangari Muta Maathai was a Kenyan politician and an environmentalist. An environmentalist works to protect the environment. She received the Nobel prize for peace in 2004. Maathai was the first black African woman to win a Nobel prize. She is known for her struggle for democracy, human rights, and the conservation of the environment.

Malala Yousafzai

Malala Yousafzai is a young Pakistani activist. In 2008 she began to protest the closing of girls' schools in her area. In 2012 she was shot as a result of her protests. Yousafzai survived the assassination attempt and spoke all over the world about the importance of the education of girls.

Rosa Parks

In 1950s America black people were treated unfairly. One person who tried to change this was Rosa Parks. On December 1, 1955, Rosa Parks was tired of having to give up her bus seat and she said “No” to a white person. This started the Montgomery bus boycott.
