

## Our Hamble Reading Raffle

This half term, we have been blown away by the amount of raffle tickets the children have been earning.

Remember, for every 10 days of reading recorded on the book mark, children receive a raffle ticket. You can only earn a maximum of 1 per day even if you read multiple

times. They pop the ticket into the box and then during our key stage assemblies, winners are picked from the tubs—you have to be in it to win it!

Over the summer break, the books were updated with new releases—all of this is funded by our book fair commission from last year. The money we earn is then spent on providing children with new books in school.

At some of our shared learning events this half term, year teams have shared the impact of reading regularly.




Why read 20 minutes at home?









The average word count for a typical novel is anywhere from 70,000 to 120,000 words

When an enormous storm blows Cloud far, far away, they're lost without each other.


Can the two friends face their fears and find their way back to one another?


## 'Cruise Ship Kid' by Emma Swan
